

Eligibility





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
All U.S. coastal states, including the Great Lakes, territories, and coastal tribal lands. Eligible areas:

- Coastal HUC-8 watersheds that drain directly to the ocean or Great Lakes
- Adjacent HUC-8 that are particularly lowlying or tidally influenced



BOUNDARY

- Projects don't have to be directly adjacent to a coastline to be eligible
- Upper watersheds are important to the downstream resilience of coastal communities and ecosystems

FAQ AROUND ELIGIBILITY

- An applicant/organization may submit multiple applications and may receive multiple awards
- Current/previous grants do not impact eligibility, but
 - Advance previous NCRF projects when the time is right
 - Past performance counts
 - Watch double counting match
- All enter on equal footing







- Output: Preliminary design for one or more sites (~30-60% design)
- Can include baseline monitoring

Evaluation Criteria



WHAT MAKES A PROPOSAL COMPETITIVE

- Be specific about community resilience and habitat benefits
- Ensure that your project is at a scale that it can address the identified community resilience challenges OR propose a transferrable or scalable approach
- Provide specific socioeconomic demographic information to show the communities that will benefit and be engaged by the work

NCRF – WHAT IS NOT A PRIORITY?

- Coastal community 'rebuilds' from storms
- Stand alone research or monitoring projects
- Small scale / isolated projects; but smaller-scale pilot projects can be made more competitive by building in a plan for transferability
- Non-natural structures (hardened shorelines, aquaculture)





TRANSFERABILITY & SCALABILITY

- Looking at project's scale AND scalability
- Tell us about your plans to transfer lessons learned from the project OR scale the approach through other programs, policies, or future phases of implementation

GREEN V GRAY – HOW MUCH GRAY IS TOO MUCH?

- We can support green-gray hybrid approaches *BUT*
 - The **pipeline category** matters
 - The **purpose** for the gray infrastructure components matters
 - OR we are looking for **match** to support gray infrastructure project components

PERMITTING & IMPLEMENTATION-READINESS

Permitting

- Must ensure compliance with <u>all</u> Federal, state or local requirements
- Obtaining <u>all</u> necessary permits and clearances are the Applicant's responsibility

Implementation-Readiness

 Proposals seeking funding for implementation MUST be able to commence construction within one year of award date.





NON-FEDERAL MATCH

- Non-federal match encouraged, but not required
- In-kind match COUNTS
 - Volunteer hours
 - In-kind support
 - Deferred indirect costs
- No priority given to higher cash percentages
- Must be specific to the scope of work for the project and within the period of performance

Data Sharing

Projects with monitoring and data collection must:

→ comply with NOAA's Data Sharing Policy for all environmental data

→ NFWF's public sharing and evaluation requirements

Application Process – Pre-Proposal Stage



Pre and Full Template

- Save your own copy of proposal narrative to computer. You will have the chance to refine, expand, and reupload if invited to full proposal
- You will NOT have access to your pre-proposal in Easygrants once you've been invited to full
- Your pre-proposal narrative should be no longer than 2 pages

PART I – PROJECT OVERVIEW

Project Category: From the drop down, select the category of activity in the Request for Proposals that will be addressed by your proposal. Select Project Category

- 1. What is the coastal resilience challenge you are seeking to address through your project? Include specific atrisk community assets (e.g., critical utilities, vulnerable populations).
- How does the proposed project integrate with past and planned future resilience activities in the area? Include any relevant actions and/or events leading up to this point that prioritize the proposed actions, such as resilience planning or assessments done at the project location.
- 3. For pipeline projects ONLY (previous stages of work funded through a NCRF grant): Provide the 5-digit Easygrants ID number of the previously funded NFWF project. What specific work was funded under the previous NCRF grant and how does this proposed work advance or build upon the previous project?
- 4. For Restoration Implementation projects ONLY: Do you have 90% final design? If not, what is your design status and when do you expect to have 90% design. Have you applied for permits and what is their status? If not, when do you intend to apply?
- 5. What is the nature-based solution(s) (NBS) that will advance the project?
- 6. How is the NBS suited to the project area? How is the scale of implementation being considered?
- 7. What are the expected deliverables and results at the proposed end date of the project?
- 8. What is the expected long-term utility and sustainability of the project? (i.e., implications for informing future, planning, management, and restoration activities).
- 9. Who was or will be engaged in project development or implementation in the community(ies) where the project will take place? Who is expected to benefit from the project being implemented?
- 10. Who are the key partners or stakeholders that will be engaged in the project or involved in implementation?
- 11. What is the demographic information of the community(ies) being served and/or engaged. For demographic information use the table below. (Sources of data include U.S. Environmental Protection Agency <u>EJScreen</u>, <u>Explore US Census Data</u>, the <u>U.S. Census Quick Facts Page</u>, and the 3) <u>American Community Survey</u> as well as state data sources etc.).

WRITING TIPS TO CONSIDER...

Project Context

- What are the specific resilience challenges and coastal hazards?
- Reference plans, pre-work and outside expertise that informed project

Solutions

- What are the specific nature-based solution(s)?
- What are potential hurdles/challenges and how you will address them?
- Realistic and measurable goals

Community Impact & Engagement

- Specific demographic information on directly impacted communities
- How community will be engaged?

Benefits

- Be specific! Provide examples
- What are the risk reduction benefits?
- What are the habitat benefits? Which species will benefit and how?
- Project sustainability



Don't make reviewers work too hard

OTHER UPLOADS – ACQUISITIONS

- Additional 1-page upload with specific questions you must answer for projects requesting funds for LAND ACQUISITION or EQUIPMENT purchase
 - Acquisitions MAY be eligible activity but must be ESSENTIAL to implementation of a Restoration-Implementation Project AND NO other funding sources available
 - For *equipment*, describe why equipment rental is not an option and your plan for complying with federal requirements related to purchase of equipment

REQUIRED UPLOADS FOR DOD FUNDING

Additional 1-page upload with specific questions you must answer for projects requesting U.S. DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE FUNDING

- Projects MUST Improve military installation resilience and benefit defense mission capabilities
- Projects MUST occur outside the installation or range
- Projects in the pre-proposal state MUST submit the contact information of the installation personnel who are part of the project team and support the proposed project efforts
- For the full proposal, applicants will be required to upload an endorsement letter from the lead Military Service, such as the installation commanding officer, to affirm support for the proposed activities. <u>This endorsement letter also signifies that the lead Military Service accepts all</u> <u>necessary environmental compliance oversight responsibilities, including those under the</u> <u>National Environmental Policy Act, the National Historic Preservation Act, and the Endangered</u> <u>Species Act</u>


- Don't apply to NCRF and ATBC for the same project




Coastal Resilience Evaluation and Siting Tool (CREST)
